LA JOLLA PLAYHOUSE ANNOUNCES 2026/2027 SEASON

Season to Feature Three World-Premiere Musicals, Plus Two New Plays, A Pulitzer Prize-Winning Broadway Hit, and the Annual WOW Festival in April

New Slate Marks Final Season Programmed by Christopher Ashley Following 18-Year Tenure as Artistic Director

La Jolla, CA — La Jolla Playhouse announces its 2026/2027 season, featuring three world-premiere musicals: *The Family Album*, a Playhouse-commissioned work with a book by **Sam Chanse**, music and lyrics by **MILCK** (aka Connie K. Lim) and **AG** (aka Adrianne Gonzalez), directed by **Jess McLeod**; *GRIM*, book by **Joey Orton** and **Brad Silnutzer**, music and lyrics by **Petro AP**, **Scott Hoying**, **Joey Orton** and **Brad Silnutzer**, directed by **Sammi Cannold**; and *Particle Fever*, book by Tony Award winner **David Henry Hwang**, music and lyrics by **Bear McCreary** and **Zoe Sarnak**, directed by Tony Award nominee **Leigh Silverman**.

The season will also include the West Coast premiere of the Tony Award- and Pulitzer Prize-winning play *Purpose*, by **Branden Jacobs-Jenkins**, directed by **Delicia Turner Sonnenberg**; the West Coast premiere of *The Monsters*, by UC San Diego graduate **Ngozi Anyanwu**, directed by **Tamilla Woodard**, in a coproduction with **Berkeley Repertory Theatre**; and the world premiere of *A Black-billed Cuckoo*, by UC San Diego graduate **Mat Smart**, directed by **Shelley Butler**, marking the 13th piece to make the jump from the Playhouse's DNA New Work Series to the subscription slate. Prior to the start of the subscription season, La Jolla Playhouse will mount its annual **WOW Festival**, presented in partnership with UC San Diego, taking place **April 23 – 26, 2026** at UC San Diego.

The 2026/2027 subscription slate marks the final season curated by **Christopher Ashley**, the Playhouse's Rich Family Artistic Director, who will depart the organization in January 2026 after nearly two decades, to lead New York's Roundabout Theatre.

"After 18 years co-leading this amazing organization with my longtime partner Debby Buchholz, it is extremely bittersweet that this will be the final season I'll be sharing at the Playhouse, but I'm ecstatic about these six extraordinary productions – programmed in partnership with Artistic Producing Director Eric Keen-Louie – which will leave audiences feeling moved and inspired," said **Ashley**. "We'll kick off the season with the Pulitzer Prize-winning *Purpose*, Branden Jacobs-Jenkins' biting and funny play that was the toast of Broadway last season. Next up will be Ngozi Anyanwu's poetic and searing new piece, *The Monsters*, which explores a sibling relationship through the dynamic lens of Mixed Martial Arts. We'll also be mounting the world premiere of *A Black-billed Cuckoo*, a humorous and deeply affecting work by Mat Smart centering on a rift among friends in a tight-knit birding group. The season will continue with three brand-new musicals: *The Family Album*, a poignant and powerful Playhouse commission by the acclaimed writing team behind the Women's March viral anthem "Quiet;" *GRIM*, a delightfully irreverent and heart-forward piece about the exploits of the Grim Reaper's daughter; and *Particle Fever*, a deeply moving work that shines a light on the passion and sense of wonder that drives our search for meaning in the universe."

Ashley continued, "These six bold, vibrant new works will ignite the Playhouse's stages in a season that marks both a grand finale and a new beginning. A huge piece of my heart will always remain at La Jolla Playhouse, and I look forward to celebrating the triumphs of this new season – and all the incredible seasons to come."

In 2017, MILCK and AG's "Quiet," a song about MILCK's survivor journey, became a viral sensation. That same spirit inspired them and acclaimed playwright Sam Chanse to draw on each of their personal stories to create *The Family Album*, a humorous and poignant original musical about finding your voice and using it for change.

ARTIST BIOGRAPHIES

LA-based producer/Grammy-nominated songwriter/mix engineer **AG** (aka Adrianne Gonzalez) (Music and Lyrics: *The Family Album*) is a powerhouse. With 600+ song placements to date, she has become one of the most prolific producers in the world of film and TV. AG's work has been featured in countless trailers, promos, films, and TV shows. She works closely with music supervisors, trailer houses, ad agencies, and film studios, including Universal, Lionsgate, Paramount, Warner Bros along with networks and streaming platforms such as HBO, STARZ, ABC, Netflix, Hulu and Amazon. AG's music has also been featured on national and global ad campaigns for Verizon, Samsung, Ford, Cadillac, Starbucks, P&G, Brawny and more. AG's catalogue has generated over 370 million streams and 430 million views on YouTube to date. AG is also in a band called The Rescues, who are currently working on a musical adaptation of *The Lost Boys* with award-winning director Michael Arden. It is set to open in April 2026. AG has made it her mission to bring diversity to the sync world in any way she can. Not satisfied with the status quo in this historically male-dominated industry, AG collaborates with and mentors the next generation of women producers, writers, and engineers as they take a solid step — and hold their ground.

Ngozi Anyanwu (Playwright: The Monsters) is a multi-hyphenated storyteller most recently seen performing in Nathan Alan Davis's The Refuge Plays at Roundabout Theatre with New York Theatre Workshop in 2023. Her upcoming play The Monsters will make its world premiere at Two River Theater, co-produced with Manhattan Theater Club, in the 25/26 season, for which she'll also direct. Her most recent play Leroy and Lucy premiered at Steppenwolf Theater (Jeff Award nomination) in the fall of 2024. She's a 2020 Steinberg Playwright Award winner. Previous productions include Last of the Love Letters at the Atlantic Theater Company, Good Grief (Vineyard Theatre – New York Times Critic's Pick/Center Theatre Group in LA) and The Homecoming Queen (sold-out world-premiere run and a New York Times Critic's pick at the Atlantic Theatre). Good Grief was on the 2016 Kilroys List, was a semi-finalist for the Princess Grace Award, and won the Humanitas Award. The Homecoming Queen was on the 2017 Kilroys List and was a Leah Ryan Finalist. Her play Nike... (2017 Kilroys List) was workshopped at The New Black Fest in conjunction with The Lark, and at The Strand Festival in conjunction with A.C.T and SPACE on Ryder Farm, and at New York Stage and Film. Anyanwu also has been commissioned by NYU, The Old Globe, Two Rivers Theatre, The Atlantic Theatre, and Steppenwolf Theater. Anyanwu has also received residencies from LCT3. The National Black Theatre, SPACE on Ryder Farm, the Dierassi Resident Artists Program, The New Harmony Project, New York Stage and Film and Page 73. She attended Point Park University (B.A.) and received her M.F.A. in Acting from UC San Diego.

Petro AP (Music and Lyrics: GRIM) is a Greek-American songwriter, producer, and musician building a world of sound from his studio in Los Angeles. His music lives in that space between pop precision and human messiness—sleek enough for radio, but raw enough to feel like real life. He produced several tracks on Reneé Rapp's debut album Snow Angel—including "Willow," "I Do," and her breakout hit "Pretty Girls." The project helped define Rapp's bold, emotional pop sound and cemented Petro as a creative force behind one of music's most exciting new voices. His writing and production credits also include collaborations with Enrique Iglesias ("Only a Woman"), Dillon Francis ("All That"), Martin Solveig ("Hey Now" ft. KYLE), and FRANKIE & Marc E. Bassy ("Problems, Problems"). He has produced multiple songs for Grace Enger, including her standout track "The Neighborhood," and worked with Meg Smith on her viral single "Girls Just Wanna Be Famous." He is currently producing an album for Madeline The Person and regularly collaborates with emerging pop artists across Los Angeles. In the world of theater, he co-wrote The Fast and the Furious: A Musical Parody, now a Los Angeles staple that's been performed in San Francisco and made its NYC debut in 2025. The show received glowing reviews for its humor, creativity, and original music. Petro also collaborates frequently with Alexander 23 and tours with him playing keyboards in his band. Together, they've traveled the world performing to sold-out crowds and sharing stages with some of pop's biggest names. Earlier in his career, he engineered and sang background vocals on One Direction's hit "Best Song Ever" — and yes, it really was.

Shelley Butler (Director: A Black-billed Cuckoo) has worked extensively with writers on new plays and musicals and has directed over two dozen new works including the world premieres of Lucas Hnath's A Doll's House, Part 2 (South Coast Repertory) and Kate Hamill's The Scarlet Letter (Two River Theater). Shelley spent two seasons as Artistic Associate in charge of New Play Development for Hartford Stage, three seasons as Artistic Associate for Great Lakes Theater Festival, and currently serves as Artistic Director for the newly created South Carolina New Play Festival. Shelley has directed and developed work nationwide for companies including: Ars Nova, Primary Stages, Ensemble Studio Theatre, WP Theater, Alliance Theatre, Geffen Playhouse, La Jolla Playhouse, Asolo Repertory Theatre, Yale Repertory Theatre, The Old Globe, Milwaukee Rep, Hartford Stage, South Coast Repertory, Denver Center for the Performing Arts, Repertory Theatre of St. Louis, Geva Theatre Center, Alabama Shakespeare Festival, Pioneer Theatre Company, Contemporary American Theater Festival, New York Stage and Film, Partial Comfort Productions, New Georges, The Playwright's Center, The Playwrights Realm, Keen Company, and New Dramatists. Shelley is the recipient of a Drama League Fall Directing Fellowship, a 2018 Drama League Directing Resident, a 2005 Director's Guild of America Trainee, and a proud member of SDC. www.shelleybutler.com

Sammi Cannold (Director: *GRIM*) is a Broadway, film, and television director who is one of *Forbes*' 30 Under 30 in Hollywood & Entertainment, one of *Variety*'s 10 Broadway Stars to Watch, and one of *Town & Country*'s Creative Aristocracy. In 2023, she made her Broadway directorial debut helming *How to Dance in Ohio*, for which she won a Drama Desk Award. In 2025, she made her episodic directing debut helming episode 2204 of *Grey's Anatomy* and was selected to develop her first feature film in the Sundance Institute Screenwriters Intensive. She has directed work at The Kennedy Center, Lincoln Center, and more than 25 non-profit theaters around the country as well as for the National Symphony Orchestra, ABC, Cirque du Soleil, and more. She has spoken at the Aspen Ideas Festival, the Global Business Summit, and TEDxBroadway and is an alum of Stanford University, the Harvard Graduate School of Education, and the Sundance Theatre Lab. sammicannold.com @sammicannold

Sam Chanse's (Book/Story: *The Family Album*) plays and other work include *what you are now* (Ensemble Studio Theatre / Civilians); *Monument, or Four Sisters* (A Sloth Play) (Magic Theatre); *Disturbance Specialist* (NAATCO / The Public Theater); *P.S.* (Ars Nova); *Lydia's Funeral Video* (Kaya Press); and *Asian American Jesus*. An alum of Ars Nova's Play Group and the Ma-Yi Writers' Lab, her work has also been developed and supported by La Jolla Playhouse, New York Stage & Film, SF Arts Commission, Ojai Playwrights Conference, Sundance Theatre Institute, and Playwrights Realm, among others. She was a writer on ABC's *The Good Doctor*, and is a former MacDowell fellow, Venturous Fellow at the Lark, and resident playwright at New Dramatists.

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Scott Hoying (Music and Lyrics: GRIM) is a three-time Grammy® Award-winning and Emmy® Award-winning singer, songwriter, producer, arranger, and artist. While studying music at USC, he discovered his passion for a cappella and started the a cappella group, Pentatonix. The vocal quintet quickly rose to international fame and has collaborated with Kelly Clarkson, Dolly Parton, Maren Morris, Jennifer Hudson, Stevie Wonder, and Andrea Bocelli, among others. With Pentatonix, Hoying has won three Grammy® Awards, sold more than 13 million albums, and received a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame. The Pentatonix YouTube channel has 20 million subscribers and more than 5.6 billion views. In 2023, Hoying released his solo debut EP, Parallel, with Sony/BMG. The standout track "Mars" was featured on *The Today Show* and *The Kelly Clarkson Show*. Hoying's solo song "Rose Without The Thorns," a tribute to his husband Mark Hoying, earned him his first solo nomination for Best Arrangement, Instrumental or A Cappella at the 2025 Grammy® Awards. Hoying has a long history of championing youth and the arts. Notably, in 2023, Hoying received an Emmy® Award for "Outstanding Music Direction" of America's Youth Choir at Super Bowl LVII. He co-created the girl group Citizen Queen and the all-kids a cappella collective, Acapop! KIDS. Hoying is very active in uplifting the LGBTQ+ and queer youth communities, working with GLAAD, LA Pride, and The Trevor Project. Hoying is a multi-hyphenate talent across all mediums. Other credits include: Dancing with the Stars, the USA Today best-Selling children's book with husband Mark Hoying, How Lucky Am I? and their upcoming children's book, Fa La La Family; Disney+ High School Musical: The Musical: The Series; Netflix #1 film Meet Me Next Christmas; Meghan Trainor (vocal arranger/producer); Disney California Adventure Park's World of Color Happiness.

David Henry Hwang's (Book: Particle Fever) stage works include the plays M. Butterfly, Yellow Face (2024 Tony Award-winning Broadway revival broadcast on PBS Great Performances), Chinglish, The Dance and the Railroad, and FOB, as well as the musicals Soft Power, Flower Drum Song and Disney's international hits Aida and Tarzan. Called America's most-produced living opera librettist by Opera News, he has written thirteen libretti, including five with Philip Glass, Dream of the Red Chamber with music by Bright Sheng (San Francisco Opera 2016), and Ainadamar with music by Osvaldo Golijov (Metropolitan Opera premiere 2024). The Monkey King, his fourth opera with Huang Ruo, will open at San Francisco Opera in November 2025. Hwang was a Writer/Consulting Producer for the Golden Globe-winning television series The Affair and co-wrote the Gold Record "Solo" with the late pop legend Prince. He is a Tony Award winner and four-time nominee, a Grammy Award winner and two-time nominee, a three-time OBIE Award winner, and a three-time Finalist for the Pulitzer Prize in Drama. Hwang was inducted into the Theatre Hall of Fame in 2018 and received the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Dramatists Guild in 2025.

Branden Jacobs-Jenkins (Playwright: *Purpose*) is a Brooklyn-based playwright. Recent theatre credits include *Purpose* (Tony Award, Pulitzer Prize; Broadway, Steppenwolf), *Appropriate* (Tony Award; Broadway, Second Stage), *The Comeuppance* (Signature Theatre), *Girls* (Yale Rep), *Everybody* (Signature Theatre), *War* (Yale Rep; Lincoln Center/LCT3), *Gloria* (Vineyard Theatre), *Appropriate* (Obie Award; Signature Theatre), *An Octoroon* (Obie Award; Soho Rep, Theatre for a New Audience) and *Neighbors* (The Public Theater). He currently teaches at Yale University and serves as Vice President of the Dramatists Guild council and on the boards of Soho Rep, Park Avenue Armory, the Susan Smith Blackburn Prize, and the Dramatists Guild Foundation. Honors include a USA Artists fellowship, a Guggenheim fellowship, the MacArthur fellowship, the Windham-Campbell Prize for Drama, and the inaugural Tennessee Williams Award.



Award-winning composer and recording artist **Bear McCreary** (Music and Lyrics: *Particle Fever*) began his career as a protégé of legendary film composer Elmer Bernstein, before bursting onto the scene scoring the revered series Battlestar Galactica in 2004. Since then, McCreary has won three Emmy Awards, including two for Disney's Percy Jackson and the Olympians and one for his theme for Da Vinci's Demons, a musical palindrome, and has won twelve International Film Music Critics Association Awards, including the award for Score of the Year in 2024, his second. Named the 23rd Most Definitive Bear in Popular Culture (The Ringer), he's also been the subject of a clue on Jeopardy!. Project highlights include The Lord of the Rings: The Rings of Power (Amazon); Foundation (Apple TV+); the beloved series Outlander (STARZ); Godzilla: King of the Monsters (Warner Bros. and Legendary Pictures); The Walking Dead (AMC); and Netflix's Academy Award-nominated documentary Crip Camp (produced by Barack and Michelle Obama). McCreary's celebrated scores for Sony PlayStation's blockbusters God of War and God of War Ragnarök have earned him two BAFTA Awards and two Grammy nominations. In 2024, McCreary released The Singularity, a hard-rock concept album featuring legendary rock talent including Slash, Serj Tankian (System of a Down), Corey Taylor (Slipknot), Rufus Wainwright, and more. McCreary has collaborated with artists from across the musical spectrum, including Hozier, Fiona Apple, Shirley Manson (Garbage), and the late Sinéad O'Connor. In 2014, Maestro Gustavo Dudamel conducted a suite of McCreary's music with the L.A. Philharmonic at the Hollywood Bowl.

Jess McLeod (she/her; Story/Concept/Direction: *The Family Album*) is a proud first generation Asian American, director and social justice advocate specializing in risky new plays and musicals about America. She has directed and developed work in New York and all over the country at theatres such as Second Stage (*On the Evolutionary Function of Shame*), Roundabout, MTC, BAM, Atlantic, P73, Little Island, Ma-Yi and regionally at Steppenwolf (*The Thanksgiving Play*), Goodman, Lyric Opera of Chicago, Alliance, La Jolla Playhouse, Williamstown, Berkeley Rep and Woolly Mammoth (*There's Always the Hudson*), where she was also a BOLD Resident Director. Current Drama League TV/Film Fellow. McLeod served as Resident Director on *Hamilton* in Chicago for three years, Lead Curator for Roundabout's 2023 Refocus Project, Co-Chair (with Michael Korie) of the Dramatist Guild Foundation's Musical Theatre Fellows Program, Artist-In-Residence at the NYCLU (Creatives Rebuild NY Grantee), and a Tony Nominator from 2022-25. She grew up in San Francisco, spent a decade in Chicago after earning her MFA in Directing from Northwestern, and currently resides in New York.

MILCK (Connie K. Lim) (Story/Concept/Music and Lyrics: *The Family Album*) is a singer/songwriter/ recording artist and humanitarian who pens anthems for healing, bridge building, and freedom. Her breakout anthem "Quiet" was named a Billboard #1 protest song, NPR's featured "American Anthems," and a top feminist anthem of all time by *Harper's Bazaar*. in 2025 *Elle UK* named MILCK as a top 40 Women of Hope. MILCK composes anthemic songs for film, television, and artists, from *Girl Climber*, the documentary, to *Grey's Anatomy*; from John Legend to Natasha Bedingfield. MILCK self-released an album titled *Mother Tongue 2/14*, and has since gone viral again with another song titled "Sisters of Winter," which will be featured on ACLU's 2025 national campaign.

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Joey Orton (Book, Music and Lyrics: *GRIM*) is a songwriter, music producer, and librettist based out of Los Angeles. His professional music career started when Taylor Swift tweeted out a song he wrote, "New Obsession," calling it a "song to make your life more awesome." Since then, Joey has written songs featuring FRANKIE (RCA Records), Scott Hoying (RCA Records), and Marc E Bassy (Universal Republic), among others, which have amassed tens of millions of streams across platforms. The music video for Joey's song "Ghost," peaked at #4 on iTunes behind only Cardi B, Taylor Swift, and Childish Gambino. Joey's commercial music credits include ad campaigns for the NBA, Life 360, Chevrolet, Britney Spears' "Fantasy Twist" fragrance, and Cisco. He is the co-creator of *The Fast and the Furious: A Musical Parody*, which runs monthly at the Dynasty Typewriter and has sold out every show since its inception. *The Fast and the Furious: A Musical Parody* was praised by feminist author Roxanne Gay, and was lauded on the *Joe Rogan Podcast*, a sign that it can unite a divided America. Outside of music and musicals, Joey holds a degree in Neuroscience, has taught Salsa dancing in downtown LA and abroad, and has at least three great *Shark Tank* ideas no one will listen to.

Zoe Sarnak (Music and Lyrics: *Particle Fever*) is a Drama Desk-nominated and Larson Award-winning composer, lyricist, and writer, as well as a finalist for the Ebb and Kleban Awards.
